Eucharistic Adoration



REFLECTION

We often judge those who are different from us. Sometimes we do it because we are scared or insecure. Sometimes we do it because we have not taken the time to get to know someone. James reminds the early followers of Jesus to avoid stereotyping others and to welcome those we judge as less than us. In high school, it is often difficult to break out of social groups because of the fear of being judged by others. When we challenge ourselves to being open to someone new (for example, maybe sit at a different table), we are helping to bring about the Kingdom of God. In today's Gospel, Jesus heals the deaf man with the speech impediment. We can be like Jesus if we reach out to those in need or those who are left on the fringes (such as another student who is sitting alone in class or at lunch). Sometimes it seems impossible to branch out. But our faith in Jesus calls us to be bold and to reach out to those in need. By doing so, we bring Jesus' love more fully to our neighbor. The way we live our Christian faith will impact others' lives.

TACTION

Try sitting with someone new in class or at lunch. It sounds cliché, but it can take a lot of strength to step out of our comfort zone and interrupt another person's routine. If you know something about the person, ask about that (like the play they are in or the sport they play). While it may seem impossible, or a social faux pas, you might surprise yourself. Not only will it impact another person's life positively, but you will plant a seed in those who notice. You never know, it might start a movement!

In 2017, Pope Francis called upon all teens to stop bullying: "Promise me, never, never mock or make fun of someone; a companion at school or in your neighborhood. . . . Do you promise this, today? . . . Do you promise Jesus?"
