REFLECTION

A few years ago, Pope Francis led the Catholic Church in a Jubilee Year of Mercy. Communities all over the world responded to this year by making a pilgrimage or trying to live out the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. This effort made the nightly news and penetrated the spirit of World Youth Day in Poland, 2016. The ripple effect ignited the Church to live more fully a life of mercy. Today's readings remind us of the vibrancy of God's mercy. Isaiah reminds us that the Messiah will come to suffer for us and Paul reminds the Hebrews that they should all confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy. In the Gospel, Jesus reminds the Apostles that to live a life of mercy requires that others go before you. Consciously embarking on a continuous journey toward mercy can bring us all closer to Jesus' left or right.
