
REFLECTION

In the accounts of Jesus' baptism, the Spirit of God descends like a dove and a voice comes from the heavens and says, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). Here we have the entire essence of Christian community, rooted in the Trinity. We see the Father, Son, and Spirit together—equal—grounded in a genuine, relational love. This is what makes God. God. The love would not be the same without any of the individual players. We cannot experience the fullness of the love of the Father without the Son and Spirit. The same is true for any other combination of the three. This Trinitarian love needs to be the model par excellence of all our relationships. We mark ourselves with the Sign of the Cross, reminding us of our true identity. We are God's beloved sons and daughters. We belong to God.

Perhaps we do not always treat others as beloved and chosen by God because we cannot accept that reality ourselves. Henri Nouwen, a Catholic priest and theologian, wrote that if we dare to believe that we are beloved, we may suddenly realize that our lives are very, very special. We realize that we have the responsibility to help our brothers and sisters know that they are also beloved sons and daughters of God, and that we all belong together.

FACTION

Next time you enter church and sign yourself with holy water, think about your Baptism and your relationship with the Trinitarian God. While this is always the purpose when we sign ourselves, it can be easy to forget what we are actually doing. Break the routine and actually take a moment to remember what you are doing and in whose name you are signing yourself.
