REFLECTION

Today's readings focus on gifts: gifts we are called to share with others in our community and the great gift Jesus shares at the Wedding at Cana. Paul reminds the first followers in 1 Corinthians that each person has their own unique gifts. These gifts must be identified and shared with the community in order to uplift others' gifts. We are not solitary creatures set a part from one another, but together with our gifts we are in the same Spirit. Sometimes it is difficult to identify what these are when self-doubt creeps in. Instead of giving any time to these doubts, consider the miracle Jesus performed at Cana. Jesus responds to Mary's request to help the young couple who ran out of wine at their wedding. Jesus not only performs this miracle, but he makes it the finest wine at the wedding. Thus, "His disciples began to believe in him" (John 2:11). Even today, John's reporting of this miracle remains an important meditation to consider. We need signs like this in our lives just as the disciples did to help us on our journey. Take a look around today at the many gifts that are present in your life and give thanks.



QUESTIONS

- ❖ What do today's readings teach you about the Christian life?
- ❖ What gifts in 1 Corinthians 12:4-11 speak to you as you pray with this reading?
- ❖ How might you tap into these spiritual gifts in your daily life?



ACTION

Sometimes we need help identifying our unique gifts. This week, take some time to ask four people whose opinion matters to you (friend, parent, coach, youth minister, etc.) what they see as your best gift. Are there similarities or differences? Are you surprised by the responses? Did you learn something about yourself? Take one of these gifts that you would like to focus on developing more and create a visual aid to put up in your room or to set as the wallpaper to your phone or laptop. Meditate on this gift and live it out!
