REFLECTION

Some find fishing a relaxing hobby. Actually catching a fish is a bonus. For others fishing is a life line to staving off hunger. The relaxed fisherman and the anxious fisherman use similar tools yet have a different urgency to their baiting and waiting. One enjoys the view, the quiet, and the thrill of catching a whopper of a fish. The other casts as far as possible praying for enough fish to feed the family with an air of urgency. The fishermen in Luke's account of the Gospel might side more with the second description here. Fishing is their livelihood and the fish are not biting. Jesus convinces them to try again and the abundance was so great the boat was at risk of sinking. The transformation in the disciples causes them to leave everything to follow Jesus. For many in our world, a miracle of abundance is needed in order to feed hungry children. This reality and Jesus' invitation to be "catching men" (Luke 5:10) calls us all to step out and help bring an abundance of God's love to those in need. May we all respond with as much enthusiasm as the early apostles.



ACTION

Go fishing! The process of fishing can be quite meditative, particularly if you do not catch anything. Instead of worrying about the possible catch, settle into a meditation on Jesus' love for you. Sit in awe at the beautiful creation surrounding you. Imagine Jesus sitting next to you on the dock or shore and check in with him. How are you becoming a catcher of men? What is holding you back? Share this with Jesus. Whether you catch a fish or not, be grateful for the opportunity to sit in wonder at God's creation and Jesus' abundant love for you.
