LIVING THE WORD

Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

REFLECTION

Moses was a reluctant leader to the Israelites. He might even be called a bit of a whiner! He did not want to take on the role of inspirer and leader to the Israelites as it seemed like an impossible task. Yet in his role, he was convincing. Can you imagine telling a group of people that all of their bad habits must stop and God would save them? His inspiring words in Deuteronomy today remind us of our own priestly duty, which “is something very near to you, already in your mouths and in your hearts; you have only to carry it out” (Deuteronomy 30:14). Jesus furthers this point in Luke’s account of the Gospel as he shares the story of the Good Samaritan. His inclination toward mercy led him to help the man who had fallen even though socially and politically they came from very different worlds. The Samaritan’s desire to act with mercy can inspire all of us to dig a little deeper into our own hesitations, eliminate our doubt, and trust that God is always merciful like the Good Samaritan.



QUESTIONS

- ❖ What do today’s readings teach you about the Christian life?
- ❖ What does Moses mean “it is something near to you” (Deuteronomy 30:14)?
- ❖ Who are you in the story of the Good Samaritan?



ACTION

Who are the outcast in your community? What are their needs? Look up an organization that represents this group locally or nationally. Try and learn all that you can about their culture and community. Check out their calendar of events and go to one of their events that is open to the public. If possible, volunteer with them. In doing so, you will show mercy to this community just as the Good Samaritan did in Luke’s account of the Gospel today.
